International Foundation for Science Granting Program

In Short:

The program is open for project proposals from developing country scientists who conduct research on the sustainable management of biological resources.

Health Topic Areas:

Health management, sustainable development in a wide sense.

Eligible Applicants:

In order to fall within the scientific scope of the IFS Mission Statement, the project must be related to the sustainable utilization of the biological and/or water resource base.

The IFS Mission Statement should be interpreted widely, to include topics in both natural and applied sciences such as agriculture, soil science, forestry, biodiversity, environmental chemistry, natural products, food science, animal husbandry, veterinary medicine, aquaculture, marine resources... as well as social or economic aspects of the sustainable management of natural resources, or the production and transfer of knowledge for sustainable development.

IFS cannot accept applications of the most basic scientific nature (e.g. theoretical physics), or even fundamental biological studies, unless they have an identifiable and direct relevance to the sustainable utilization of biological and/or water resources.

Description:

An IFS Research Grant has a maximum value of USD 12,000. It is awarded to an individual researcher, for a specific research project, presented by the Applicant in the Application form. The IFS Research Grant is intended for the purchase of the basic tools needed to conduct the proposed research project - equipment, expendable supplies, and literature - and to arrange fieldwork activities related to the proposed project. The grant cannot be used to pay for the aspiring Grantee's own salary or for honoraria, or to cover tuition fees or living expenses. It is expected that the IFS Grantees already receive a salary and are employed by or otherwise attached to a developing country research institution.

Global Fund for Women Grants

British Council Researcher Exchange Program (RXP) Exchange Awards

In Short:

Aims to promote the development of scientific cooperation and contacts between the UK and other countries.

Health Topic Areas:

Biotechnology and Information Communication Technology (ICT) among others.

Eligible Applicants:

The application must be for a new link for the individual researcher. The exchange can be part of an already established link between institutions or research groups, but only as long as that researcher has not taken part before.

The applicant must be an early stage researcher (either obtained a doctoral qualification or be within 12 months of obtaining a doctoral qualification; have no more than two years full tenure in a university or research institute; have no more than six years overall active researcher experience after the completion of a doctoral degree) and should not have significant previous international research experience in the country where they are applying to visit.

The applicant can apply to travel between the UK and any other country, but should be aware that the next countries already have British Council-funded bilateral exchange programs – France, Germany, Greece, India, Italy, Netherlands, Portugal, Russia, Slovenia, Turkey. In the event there is strong competition for RXP funding, countries without existing exchange programs will be favored.

Description:

The maximum award that can be applied for is £5,000.

The awards are for travel and subsistence. A small amount of the award can also be used for consumables, up to £250, although it is expected that the receiving lab will provide most of these resources. It cannot be used to cover bench fees, utility bills or staffing overheads, equipment or salaries.

U.S. and non-U.S. entities and individuals with the skills, knowledge, and resources necessary to carry out the proposed research.

Foreign institutions in low- and middle-income countries may only apply for planning grants. Upon successful completion of a planning grant, foreign institutions will be eligible to apply for a full AITRP award, beginning in 2010. (See <http://www.worldbank.org/data/countryclass/countryclass.html> for World Bank country classification tables to identify the countries considered to low- or middle-income countries.)

Description:

The applications for full awards should describe research-training programs that provide a variety of short-, medium- and long-term training within the context of ongoing collaborations that address the HIV epidemic and response to the epidemic in the country(ies). Applicants are expected to provide support and mentoring for trainees to conduct the research related to their training in their country to the greatest extent possible. U.S. applicants should include a plan that demonstrates the increasing research training options and responsibilities to any collaborating foreign institution during the course of the five-year award.

The Royal Society International Joint Project Grants Program

In Short:

Supports international collaboration by providing marginal costs of research and travel.

- Currently Joint Projects are available to those in Former Soviet Union countries, Ghana, Tanzania, South Africa and certain countries in Latin America.
- Joint Projects are intended for UK and overseas scientists of proven research ability. The Project Leaders must be of at least postdoctoral status or equivalent.

- Applications will only be considered for bilateral (not multi-lateral) projects.
- Project teams must be from academia and not industry.

The Joint Project scheme runs for two years. The Joint Project grant provides a maximum of £6000 per year. This may be used to claim the costs of travel and subsistence. Within the £6000 cap, the UK Leader may request up to £1000 maximum for research expenses (excluding computer hardware).

Doctoral Fellowships of the Schering Foundation

A fellowship for young outstanding specialists in biological, chemical, or medical basic research to continue their studies.

The Ph. D. thesis should not have been started at the time of the application.

Applicants must possess all of the following qualifications in order to be eligible-unless specific exemptions are stated.

- Citizenship or permanent resident status qualifying the applicant to hold a valid passport issued in the country in which the application is made.
- Doctoral degree or equivalent professional training or experience at the time of application. For professionals and artists outside academe, recognized professional standing and substantial professional accomplishment is expected.
- A detailed statement of proposed activity for research or lecturing at a US institution.
- Proficiency in English appropriate to the proposed lecturing or research project to be carried out in the United States.
- Sound physical and mental health.

Description:

Each year some 800 faculty and professionals from around the world receive Fulbright Scholar grants for advanced research and university lecturing in the United States. Individual grants are available to scholars from over 130 countries. Individuals who meet the eligibility requirements apply for grants through the Fulbright commission/foundation or public affairs section of the U.S. embassy in their home countries.

Georg Forster Research Fellowships

Eligible Applicants:

Scholars (Doctorate or comparable academic degree (Ph.D., C.Sc. or equivalent) and/or research work over several years, proven in a convincing manner *via* publications in (internationally) recognized scientific journals) from developing countries of age not over 45 years. There are no quotas in respect of country or discipline. The subject of the research proposal must be of relevance to development policy and particularly suited to the transfer of knowledge and methods to developing countries.

Description:

Monthly research fellowship rates range between EUR 2,100 and EUR 3,000. Fellowship rates are set by the selection committee.

Fellowships may be requested for periods of between 6 and 12 months. Extensions may be granted in well-founded cases.

Part of the period covered by the fellowship may be spent at a research institute in another European country if this is essential for academic reasons.

Applications may be submitted to the AvH at any time. They should be sent to the Selection Department of the Humboldt Foundation directly, if possible, or otherwise be forwarded through the Federal Republic of Germany's foreign missions or the regional offices of the German Academic Exchange Service (DAAD).
